KEYNOTE SPEAKER LISA K. NOLAN. DVM. PHD. MS



Dr. Lisa K. Nolan is dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Georgia (UGA) and the Georgia Athletics Association distinguished professor. Prior to joining UGA, she held several positions at Iowa State University's College of Veterinary Medicine including: professor and Dr. Stephen G. Juelsgaard Dean; associate dean of research and graduate studies; associate dean of academic and student affairs; and chair of the Department of Veterinary Microbiology and Preventive Medicine. She was also the Gehrts presidential professor and founding director of the

Great Plains Institute of Food Safety at North Dakota State University.

Over the course of her career, Dr. Nolan has received several honors including: being named a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science; fellow of the American Academy of Microbiology; honorary diplomate of the American Veterinary Epidemiology Society; honorary member of the American Association of Food Safety and Public Health; distinguished educator from the Blue Key National Honor Society; distinguished alumna from the UGA College of Veterinary Medicine and Valdosta State University. She has also received the Philbro Animal Health Excellence in Poultry Research Award, been named to the American Association of Avian Pathologists Hall of Fame, and recognized as a female pioneer in poultry medicine.

Her research centers on bacterial diseases that impact animal health, human health, and food safety. In particular, she studies the Escherichia coli that cause avian colibacillosis and human urinary tract infections, neonatal meningitis, and sepsis.

Dr. Nolan earned her Doctor of Veterinary Medicine and PhD from the University of Georgia after obtaining a Bachelor of Science in biology from Valdosta State College.

JEREMY REDMOND, DVM '16, MS, DACVIM (LAIM)



Jeremy Redmond, DVM '16, is assistant professor in equine medicine at Louisiana State University (LSU), where he also consults and assists the food animal team, working in small ruminant medicine. Additionally, Dr. Redmond is highly active in LSU's clinical skills program, helping students enhance their practical skills, which ties in with their classroom knowledge.

A Vermont native, Dr. Redmond has traveled the US and beyond in his educational pursuits. Prior

to earning his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine from St. George's University and completing his clinical year at Iowa State University, he attended Pennsylvania State University, where he obtained his undergraduate degree in animal science. He followed this with a master's in reproductive physiology from Texas A&M University, where he focused on the reproductive maturation of ewe lambs.

While on his own academic journey, it became clear to Dr. Redmond that one of his greatest passions was educating others. Therefore, he later returned to SGU as an instructor in the Department of Large Animal Medicine and Surgery before starting a large animal rotating internship back at Texas A&M.

From there, he traveled to the Pacific Northwest to complete a large animal medicine residency at Oregon State University. After completing his residency, Dr. Redmond stayed on at Oregon State as an instructor in large animal medicine before relocating to Louisiana State University where he now works.

Dr. Redmond became a board-certified specialist in large animal internal medicine in 2022 and is currently pursuing a Master of Veterinary Education to support his continuous passion for teaching and learning.
