KEYNOTE SPEAKER

DEAN A. HENDRICKSON, DVM, MS, DACVS



Dean A. Hendrickson, DVM, is an equine surgeon and professor in the Department of Clinical Sciences at Colorado State University (CSU), where he is involved in the teaching of all aspects of equine surgery including orthopedics and soft tissue.

Before joining CSU in 1994, Dr. Hendrickson began his career as a faculty member at the University of Wisconsin-Madison's School of Veterinary Medicine.

Throughout his career, Dr. Hendrickson has spoken internationally on topics such as wound care, minimally invasive surgery, and orthopedics. He has also completed a textbook on equine wound care and the 4th edition of Turner and McIlwraith's Large Animal Surgical Techniques.

Dr. Hendrickson received his veterinary medical degree from Colorado State University in 1988 and completed an equine surgery and medicine internship at the University of Sydney in Sydney, Australia in 1989. He later completed a three-year combined large animal surgery residency and Master of Science program at Cornell University in 1992.
